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Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Grace and peace to you from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ Amen.

No Church Council in over 100 years has had to deal with a pandemic, and with the guidance of our called/elected Church leadership, we have been given sound, Christian plans to care for ourselves and each other.

Thank you to all who have continued as “essential” workers in grocery stores, pharmacies, front line workers in hospitals, EMS, Fire Services and extended care facilities. We urge you to continue your personal ministries. You are THE CHURCH in the world.

As we anticipate first phases of reopening, the Joint Council will endeavor to make deliberate, careful **plans** to keep us safe as we look forward to the day when we can meet and worship in person. The Joint Council continues to meet on a regular basis to discuss plans to resume in-person worship services. - Prior to the meeting, Pastor Brenda had shared information from both Bishop Elizabeth Eaton of the ELCA and Bishop Katherine Finegan of the NGL Synod concerning guidelines and suggestions for opening our buildings, along with a letter from the Pastors of the Menominee Valley Conference.
- Purpose of the meeting was to discuss options for the path forward as far as opening our buildings and holding in-church services and gatherings as, hopefully, this virus pandemic eases.
- After discussion, it was determined to continue with the on-line worship services and daily devotions (both have been very well received) for the next month.
- Pastor Brenda also put out a request for anyone wishing to help with the devotions or willing to read the Lessons for Sunday worship.
- It was also determined that the Council presidents, Wendy Hanson and Pete Thoun, would draft a letter to be shared with all members of both congregations to highlight and inform everyone of our decision concerning building use and our ongoing financial need even while the buildings are closed.
- The next combined Council meeting was set for June 23, 2020 at 6:15 pm
- Meeting was closed with the Lord's Prayer.

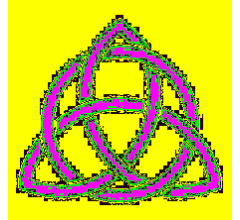

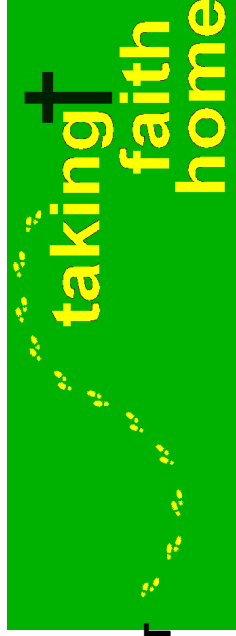

DEVOTIONS

Read: Romans 6:12-23.

Since the time Paul conveyed the radical message "where sin increased, grace abounded all the more" (Romans 5:20b), Christians and non-Christians alike have wondered if the Christian faith was license to live immorally. If our sin leads to God's grace, should we help God out by sinning all the more so that God's grace will be extended all the more? Heavens, no, answers Paul (6:15). What then? Sin is not simply bad actions. For Paul, sin is a demonic power in the universe opposed to everything that is of God. Being baptized into Christ is to die to that life opposed to God (6:4). What do we do then? With everything in us, we live "to God as instruments of righteousness" (6:13). We gladly participate in God's saving activity in the world with our words, actions, thoughts, and hopes. The life ruled by Christ is not easy to comprehend so Paul writes, "I am speaking in human terms because of your natural limitations," so just go for it! Give it your all for the sake of all that is holy, just, and full of God's presence (v. 19). How does God's grace give you a desire to do all you can to love and serve in Christ's name?

Pray: Gracious God, give us the desire to serve in your kingdom as instruments of your goodness through Christ our Lord. Amen.



SERVICE

Leading a life as a follower of Jesus can seem to be a big task. In Matthew 10, Jesus reminds us that even the small things we do are acts of service, like giving a cup of water (v.42). Giving a drink of water, holding a door, and offering a kind word can make a difference in someone's life. What acts of service can you do this week?



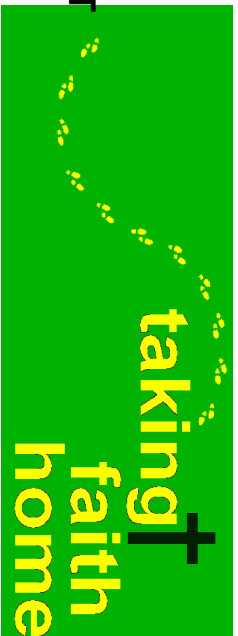
RITUALS AND TRADITIONS

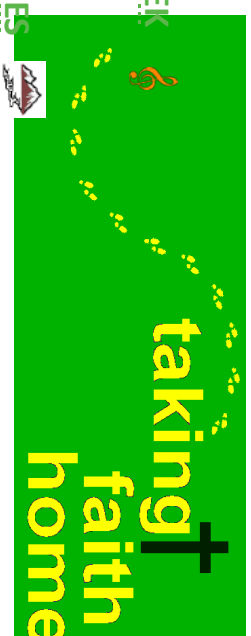

CARING CONVERSATIONS

Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- What is something you would like to accomplish in the next year?
- What is it about that accomplishment that is important to you?
- Why do you think Jesus wants us to value a relationship with him above all things?

DEVOTIONS



Read: Matthew 10:24-39.

Core values are important because they define what we stand for and who we are. Jesus indicates that following him is non-negotiable and an all-or-nothing proposition. Sometimes we must let go of what we treasure in life to gain what really counts in God's kingdom. In the process, Jesus gives a number of stark contrasts, many of which are hard to hear. Following Jesus will lead some to be rejected by family, which was a reality in first century Christianity and can be true today, too. Acknowledge Jesus and he will acknowledge you. Deny him and he will deny you. In the midst of these tough passages is Jesus' repeated theme of not being afraid (vv. 26, 28, and 31). Jesus warns us not to deny him before others, but Peter does three times before Jesus' crucifixion (Matthew 26:69-75). What Peter learns is that mercy, not judgment is the ultimate core value in the kingdom. God's mercy takes away our fear. Jesus calls us to make a difference and to rely on him. We all falter. Jesus doesn't. This is the newness of life that the Apostle Paul identifies (Romans 6:4) for the baptized that stands out for its dramatically different way of living. How does God's mercy help you not to be afraid?

Pray: Dear God, may our life in Christ give us peace and good courage as we live each day with others. Amen.

SERVICE



Sunday is Father's Day. Take time to offer prayers of thanksgiving and support for fathers and all men as they seek to be caregivers to those around them. Begin your prayers by saying, "Dear God, thank you for (name) . . ." Contact or visit those for whom you have prayed and/or send them a card as a sign of your appreciation and thankfulness.

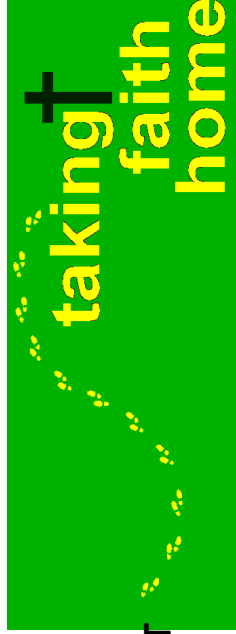

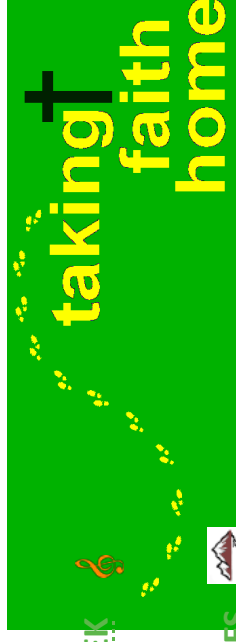

DEVOTIONS



Read: Matthew 9:35–10:23.

In the Old Testament lesson for this week (Exodus 19:2-8a) God once again establishes a covenant with the house of Jacob, just as God established a covenant with Abram in Genesis 12. God is making a priestly people, a holy nation to bless the world. In Matthew 9 and 10, Jesus now is establishing his covenant with his followers to bless others. Just as Jesus himself tells good news to people and heals every disease and sickness (9:35), his followers will go out and do similar acts of the kingdom (10:1 and 7). Those sent out by Jesus are doing the work of Jesus. The task was not easy for Jesus and will not be easy for his followers (10:16-23), but the Spirit of God will go with them (10:20). This passage is filled with compassion and is sobering at the same time. This is not someone else's ministry. It is the call all followers of Jesus have in some form. It is a daring mission that requires courage and wisdom (10:16). It is not an optional task. Our work as Jesus' hands, feet, and voice in the world day in and day out wins because we do not go alone, but with the Spirit of God. How do you accomplish the task of being Jesus' hands, feet, and voice in the world?

Pray: **Almighty God, send us out with your message of hope and compassion that heals through Christ our Savior and Lord. Amen.**

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



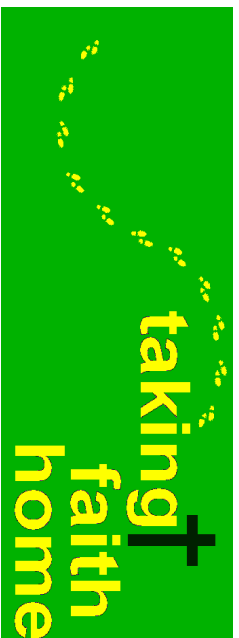

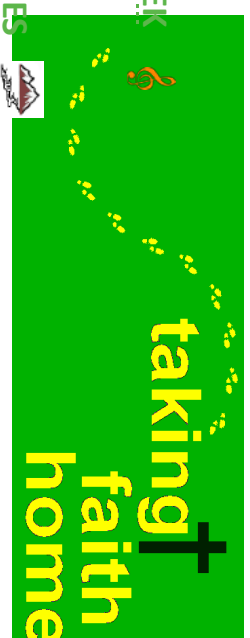

CARING CONVERSATIONS



Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- When have you been given responsibility to care for something very important?
- How do you care for God's creation?
- You have been created in the image of God to care for others. Tell or think about a story of how you cared for someone or someone cared for you.

DEVOTIONS



Read: Genesis 1:1–2:4a.

The goodness of creation is described through the harmony of creation: there is a greater light (sun) in balance with a lesser light (moon); earth, sea, and sky work together; the earth brings forth living creatures of every kind; and, it is all good. God creates a world to enjoy and a world we are to care for (1:27-30). God's reign on earth will happen through human beings, the creatures to whom God has uniquely given God's image. The creation story gives us a dignity and an assignment to care for all creation (see Psalm 8). We celebrate the Trinity this Sunday as a reminder of our relationship to God, the one who created us in the image of God to go out and care for the world. In this same spirit, Jesus sends out his followers to serve in the image of God and do the work of Christ in the world to recreate, redeem, and sustain all that God made. Reflect on how God sends you out to care for the earth.

Pray: Dear Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer, you made us to be creatures of dignity and responsibility; bless us now to live as your chosen ones. Amen.

SERVICE



God gave us "every plant yielding seed", "every tree with seed in its fruit", and "every green plant for food" (Genesis 1:29-30). Keeping soil healthy contributes to a living ecosystem and enables food production. There are ways to restore nutrient-poor fields to their natural productive abilities. Visit a local organic farm association or master gardener to learn about food conservation. How can you support their efforts?

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



This is Trinity Sunday. In the word Trinity, "tri" means "three" and "unity" means one. Draw a triangle on a piece of paper. Write Father, Son, and Holy Spirit in each of the corners. Think or talk about what each one means to you. In the center of the triangle draw a heart and write the word love. Pray: Dear God, we praise you for your abundant love. Thank you for sending Jesus to teach us. Please help us to open our hearts to the work of the Holy Spirit. Amen.
