COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS NOVEMBER 18, 2021

** Pastor Brenda noted that the media upgrade in the sanctuary has been completed and is working!!

** It has been determined that worship services will be held inside beginning in December at the regular service times. Masks will be optional, communion will continue to be self-serve, and the offering will be collected upon entering.

** It was decided to seek bids for the replacement of the heating/cooling systems in the church building considering we have been advised by the repairman that it is time to begin saving \$\$'s to replace the units as it is getting harder to find replacement parts. The bids will give us an idea of how much this would cost so that we can plan accordingly.

** Pastor B presented the Council with a "Safe Church" policy she has put together outlining the supervision guidelines for young children and teens while in the church buildings or during church sponsored events including travel to and from.

** Ruth presented a preliminary budget proposal for 2022 - discussion followed with some changes being made. The final proposal will be acted on at the December Council meeting to be voted on at the Annual Meeting.

UPDATE FROM BISHOP FINEGAN



***Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what is seen?
But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience." ~Romans 8:24-25***

Dear Northern Great Lakes Synod, You have no doubt noticed the increasing darkness. The kids go to school in the dark, and soon, the school day will end as it began, in darkness. The hours of light are getting shorter and shorter, and people are grateful for lingering twilight. How ironic that the most hopeful season of the church year begins as the darkness increases. In the weeks to come, we light candles on the Advent wreath, and it's not a moment too soon. These lights of hope stand against the growing darkness. And every week, as we add the flame of another candle, the light will increase and shine brighter even as the darkness comes sooner and lasts longer. In this season of Hope, and as this year of Hope 2021 comes to its end, I share with you some things that I do see that give me hope:

1. **Our congregations continue to find new, creative ways to do ministry.** As I read through your newsletters, whether online or hard copy, I am impressed and encouraged by your continued efforts. Sure, some things have paused. Yes, some priorities have been re-evaluated and energies placed in new directions. Yet, this is all good as we continue to be church together and church for the sake of the world. I am grateful to the Spirit that is at work among and through us as the work of Christ continues.
2. **We have wonderful pastoral leaders!** In the past few years, we have welcomed many new pastors and they bring new energy, perspective, and ideas. And our seasoned pastors and Licensed Lay Ministers have provided stability and the blessing of trusted relationships that keep congregational partnerships in motion and help reduce anxiety. And congregations in pastoral transition have been patient and involved, waiting for God's timing with hope.
3. **We have renewed joy in being together again...safely.** As pandemic restrictions have eased, Pastor Jim and I are once again happy to gather with you for worship. I do not mind wearing a mask if it means we can sing together and gather in the same space. I love hearing the voices of others raised in song and prayer. It has felt like salve on a wound to share the peace, sing alto to someone's soprano, and hear combined voices pray the Lord's prayer together in the rhythm and cadence of voices in unison. While I truly believe that some sense of community can be achieved and appreciated through Zoom, YouTube, and Facebook live, the joy and value of the community gathered in person is also true and real.
4. **Our synod is newly connected** through Lifelong Faith Formation, Pastoral Leader Check-Ins, and various Zoom meetings. While I have missed being able to add lunch and snacks to in-person Synod meetings, in many ways we are more connected as a synod than we have ever been. Teachers and students from the Copper Country to Marinette, from Ironwood to Sault Ste. Marie gather in virtual classrooms and discussion groups. We are church together in a whole new way, gathering to discuss and wrestle with conversations about issues of race, scriptural interpretation, and to consider and plan various ministry efforts.
5. **God is at work!** In all our efforts, in all our re-evaluations, in all the changes and future uncertainty, the Spirit of the living Christ is gathering, inspiring, supporting, and guiding. We are discovering again what it means to be church, what the purpose of the Body of Christ is in this world, and who we are in mission together. I see a new hunger for deeper spirituality and for meaningful connectedness to God and each other. I see ministry efforts taking on a life of their own. I see details and pieces falling together. I see a willingness to experiment, to try new things, to jump even when the landing is unclear.



There is much to be hopeful for because of what we can see even as we continue to hope for that which is still becoming. As Advent candles are lit, as the glow from the manger bed grows brighter, as we strain to hear the songs of angels, remember that you are not alone. In hopeful anticipation of Christmas and a blessed New Year, I believe it is not too soon to share the following verse from "It Came upon the Midnight Clear" that speaks anew to our present circumstances: And you, beneath life's crushing load, whose forms are bending low, who toil along the climbing way with painful steps and slow: look now, for glad and golden hours come swiftly on the wing; Oh, rest beside the weary road and hear the angels sing!

Pray: **Come, Lord Jesus, renew us in faith each day that we may prepare for your coming into our lives so that all may live in hope through the power of forgiveness. Amen.**

For Luke 1, the answer is everything. It is the same God. The God of the Old Testament keeps promises, like the promise of new life to Elizabeth, a woman beyond the child-bearing years, and Mary, a young maiden without a husband. This is the God who cares for the lowly and brings down the powerful, cares for the hungry, and sends the rich away empty. This new world order of lifting up the lowly is never fully lived out in Luke for all to see, but God's mercy definitely changes lives and households, like those of Elizabeth and Mary. God's steadfast love and mercy is here to stay, and God's people rejoice.

Discuss: Where do you see God's love today?

Pray: Loving God, just as you gave Elizabeth and Mary reason to rejoice, fill us with love and joy in your presence through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. Amen.

SERVICE

Jesus calls us to serve our neighbor in love. Based on the Daily Bible Readings and theme this week, how can you care for the lowly and feed the hungry?

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS

For this Fourth Sunday of Advent, we light four candles on the Advent Wreath.

Say: We light the first candle, the Prophet's candle, the second candle, the Bethlehem candle, the third candle, the Shepherd's candle, and light the fourth candle, the Angel's candle. The fourth candle announces Jesus' mission on earth to love and unite all people, bringing them closer to God. May we prepare for the coming of Christ into our lives and our world with hope, peace, joy, and love.

Pray: Dear God, give us faith to trust your word, peace to care for others, hope in your promise, joy for the coming of Jesus, and love to share through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Growth is a part of life. That growth can be physical, mental, emotional, and spiritual. What was it like for Jesus to grow up both human and divine? Amazingly, in the four New Testament Gospels, only this childhood story from Jesus' life exists. It says quite a bit: Jesus lived in a community of care with parents and other adults; he grew up as a Jew, going with his family to Jerusalem for the Passover; he experienced tensions with his parents as he explored his faith with elders in the temple; Jesus was obedient to his parents; his mother observed Jesus' development with awe; and, Jesus grew and gained wisdom and the approval of God and humans alike. God's unfathomable entry into our world brings divine acceptance of us through a baby, then a child, and finally an adult who brings God's saving work for all.

Discuss: What questions do you have about what it was like for Jesus to be fully human yet fully divine?

Pray: Awesome God, for what we understand and what we cannot understand about all that you have done for us in love, we give you thanks through Christ Jesus our Savior. Amen.

SERVICE

Jesus calls us to serve our neighbor in love. Based on the Daily Bible Readings and theme this week, in what ways can you reflect the love of Jesus to others?

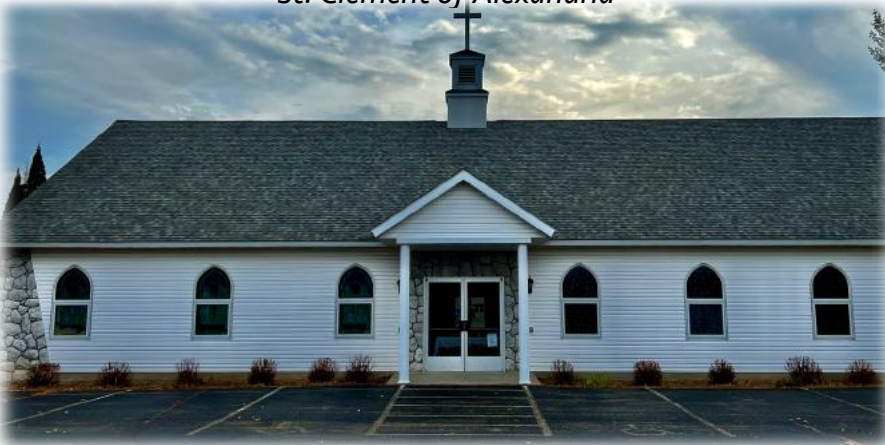
RITUALS AND TRADITIONS

Read these verses slowly. Treasure the message that Mary treasured. As the hymn *O Little Town of Bethlehem* says, "The hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight." From a small town, from peasants tending sheep at night, and for a young couple gazing at their newborn son, comes a message that conquers powerful empires. When political, economic, and military realms wreak havoc on defenseless people, whether ancient or modern, God remembers promises made and enters into human history. The Christmas gospel confidently tells the story of God's determination, God's loyalty, and the power of God's reign even while suffering lingers in our daily lives. The angels sing, "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favors." This is the story of God's glory and power that will not be stopped.

Discuss: Who is someone to whom you would like to tell the story about the birth of Jesus?

Pray: **God of love and mercy, help us to remember the story of Jesus' birth and your entry into our lives that gives us eternal hope and peace. Amen.**

SERVICE

Jesus calls us to serve our neighbor in love. Based on the Christmas Bible Readings and theme, what act of kindness can you do for someone in need?

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS

For Christmas Eve and Christmas Day, light the four candles on the Advent Wreath plus the white candle in the center.

Say: We light the Prophet's, Bethlehem, Shepherd's, and Angel's candles on the Advent wreath symbolizing God's unending love. We now light the white candle, the Christ candle, that represents the birth of Jesus and hope for all the world.

Pray: Dear God, we thank you for entering our world. May we show your hope, peace, joy and love in our daily lives, through Christ Jesus. Amen.
