The Gift of Life

Session 2

The Gift of Choices

Friday, May 13

Making end-of-life decisions during a time of illness or grief can be stressful and confusing. Do my loved ones know my wishes? Is this what Mom would have wanted? Let us name our fears and express our concerns together, as we face this God-given mystery of death, all the while remembering the confident hope in the Gospel's promise of eternal life.

Session 3

Crafting a Funeral

Friday, May 20

We'll spend some time understanding the marks of a Christian funeral, a service that is an occasion for thanksgiving and the proclamation of the resurrection of Jesus Christ. While the ministry of the funeral is for those who are yet living, we will explore certain components that can personalize the experience to reflect your life as a whole.

Session 4 Essential Touchstones of Grief

Friday, May 27

The journey of grief is both normal and necessary, yet it can also be quite complex. The work of Dr. Alan Wolfelt will guide our final session, as we understand both our grief, and how to find hope in healing our hearts.

Pastoral Musings

Dear Church, *Alleluia! Christ is Risen! He is risen, indeed! Alleluia!* Greetings in the name of the One who was victorious over death, and offers that same resurrection hope to us all.



As many of you know, I recently returned from a Quilting Trip to Branson, MO. Aside from taking in the AMAZING sights and sounds of the Quilting World (*there are over 23,000 Swarovski Crystals on the quilt pictured here!*), I also had the opportunity VISIT the Sights and Sound Theater, and witness their production of “Jesus: Live on Stage”.

Now, aside from the title itself making me chuckle (*“What!? Live on stage!? Who needs the Bible...He’s in Branson!”*), we were treated to an incredible night of, well, sights and sounds! **LIVE** animals were scattered throughout the evening, including **CAMELS**. No, not two people dressed-up in one of those ridiculous “*You be the front bump I’ll be the back bump*” kind of costumes, but REAL, LIVE, TALL camels. Dogs, pigs, chickens, horses – all of these animals made an appearance on the stages. Yes, stages – plural! Aside from the massive, **MAIN** stage in front of us, there were **two** additional stages on either side of the audience. (*The show runs through October 2022...take a road trip and treat yourself to the experience!*)



One particular **scene** has continued to resonate with me: it’s the scene that is known as the **descent from the cross**. Famous artists have represented this moment after Jesus’ death throughout history (*Rembrandt, being one*), but nothing prepared me for depiction of **lowering a dead body back to the ground**. What was especially touching – and what has stuck with me from that scene – was the Disciple’s use of the cloth placed **under** each of Jesus’s arms to carefully and

tenderly lower him to the ground. They laid their Friend and Rabbi on the ground, and then pulled the cloth back up **into the position we see** in the picture included here.

We’re **USED** to seeing the cloth hung in this way, so nicely draped over each arm of the cross...but I can’t unsee it being used to lower the **body** of Jesus. Perhaps we need moments like this to remind us of the horrors of the cross...and the **POWER of God**. We dress up an instrument of DEATH...but God turned it into a symbol of **LIFE**. We wear a tool of torture around our necks....but Jesus is the One who **saved** ALL of our necks. We’ll continue to drape our crosses in celebratory fashion, but we do so remembering and honoring the God who came to Earth for EACH and EVERY one of US! Thanks be to GOD...AMEN!
