Behind the Scenes: MUSIC Edition

What goes into the MUSIC of a worship service? Why, I'm glad you asked!



Prelude: This music has to be something that is **seasonally** appropriate, and can **continuously** play for 30+ minutes or more. I like to choose a collection of something **pensive**, as to help us prepare our hearts and minds for worship. The music will loop...until I walk in, and the computer tech advances the slides.

Hymns: Each hymn chosen has the goal of propelling us through **praise** with the spirit of **worship**, and **connects** us to the **Scripture** readings of the day.

Then, I'll go **online** - usually, I head on over to smallchurchmusic.com - which has over 15,000 recordings to choose from - or I'll visit [YouTube](https://www.youtube.com/) - and **download** an instrumental **recording** of the hymn. Selecting the right recordings and finding versions that fits our worship tone/mood for each worship service can take hours...but we've only just begun!

Next, I plug that recording into a program called **GarageBand**, where I make sure it has the right number of **verses**, an introduction, and an ending that sounds conclusive. *See all those layers!?* →



Once that version is in place, I take the edited recording and plug it into ANOTHER program called **Audacity**, that allows me to adjust both the **pitch** of the song (*nobody needs to actually REACH heaven by singing Lift High the Cross at a ridiculously high pitch*) and the **tempo** of the song (*again, Congregational participation will cease if we sing Jesus Loves Me at the pace of a funeral dirge!*)

FINALLY, the hymn is ready to be plugged into the **PowerPoint** that you see on the TVs, allowing us to literally click a button, and have the music play. Mind you, the fun doesn't end just because the PowerPoint is ready to go - each slide that has music has to be **individually tested** over the sound system - we don't want any sudden **volume** spikes scaring anyone during the Hymn of the Day!

Prayers: I choose to keep the music that's played during the prayers **LIVE**, with me at the piano, so the **Congregation** can control the **pacing**. We'd never want to rush our heartfelt prayers, or the people reading them, thus the piano can simply add a backdrop as folks read each petition. I pray that this adds to a more meditative atmosphere. After two petitions are read? We prayerfully sing our response.

Communion: I've learned that it's easy to **lose** one's place while singing during Communion (*as you'll leave your pew mid-verse and return during a different verse*). Thus, I'll often include a **voice-over** of me singing each verse to help us all through the Communion Hymn (*a recording will have to do, as I'm busy serving!*) Sometimes, (*time-willing*) I'll even record the **harmony** parts, meaning, if you hear **multiple** people singing during Communion, chances are, it's me (soprano) + me (alto) + me (tenor)! (*Forget about the bass - it's just too low!*) Once the Communion Hymn is **complete**, you'll hear an instrumental version of that hymn continue until I'm ready at the altar to continue.



Postlude: This is the **final** piece of music you'll hear upon exiting the Sanctuary. It's usually an instrumental recording of the **Sending** Hymn, intended to musically **SEND YOU** on your way **rejoicing!**

Welcome, Solomon!

Our building custodian, **Tony**, wanted to introduce a new friend of Gethsemane: **Solomon, the Wyze**. Named after the wise King from the Bible, our Solomon (*made by the company, Wyze*), is a circular, **robotic vacuum cleaner** that has been helping Tony keep our building in tip-top shape.

Room Mapping: Solomon has the smarts to figure out where the tables and chairs and plants are located in each room, and has made himself a digital map to help him clean more efficiently

Path Planning: Super-cool sensors detect where Solomon **SHOULD** go (*under the Sanctuary pews and Fellowship Hall chairs*) and where Solomon should **NOT** go (*outside or over electrical cords*). You'll probably notice the chairs neatly pulled away from tables in the Fellowship Hall - that's to help Solomon plan his path.

Efficient Cleaning: Sol has a bunch of **brushes** alongside every edge (yay for being a circle!) that sweeps debris toward the center of the vacuum. A high-powered, center brush works with some serious **suction**-power to pull up every bit of dust and dirt off of our floors. Tony can run the vacuum during the night, maximizing his cleaning time, and simply empty Solomon's bin the next day.



Charging: Solomon has the awesome ability to **drive** himself back to his little charging station once he's done cleaning. If the battery happens to run **low** during a longer cleaning, he returns to his charging station to re-charge...and then gets right back to work!

Multi-Surface: His versatile **wheels** allow him to cross over uneven surfaces, from the tile in our bathrooms to the carpet in our hallways. His low **height** allows him to sneak under our fridge, and clean-out those dust bunnies, too!

While we've had a few hiccups getting Solomon to clean **WHEN** we'd like him to clean (*NOT during Quilters or Bible Study*), we're hopeful that he will indeed live up to his namesake, and clean our building **WYZE-ly**! **Welcome aboard, Solomon!**

You Can Learn a Lot from a Dog

A daily practice of mine is to walk my dog, Juergen. Juergen is always eager to go for a walk. No surprise there! My wife describes him as "4- Legged Joy with a Tail." I named Juergen after one of my favorite theologians, Juergen Moltmann.

Recently we took a walk in a large pasture area on public land. Fresh snows and ice left the snow deep but very crusty on the top. Juergen was so excited for his walk, but this time he sensed early on that there would be problems. He ran out ahead of me, but he was very much slowed down by the crusty snow breaking way and his legs sinking into the deep snow. It was very difficult for him to "blaze" a new trail on his own.

I felt sorry for Juergen for not having the typical freedom to merely bounce on ahead of me. Eventually, Juergen slowed down. I could tell he was becoming fatigued, and this walking experience was not pleasant at all. I, too, was having difficulty blazing my own trail. I really should have been wearing snowshoes, but with my winter boots I was able to stomp down and create size 13 divots in the deep snow.

What happened next caught my attention. My dog slowed down. He then started following me so that his paws could easily follow in my footprints without him having to break through snow. Even though it slowed him down, Juergen was having a much more enjoyable time following in my clear footprints in the snow.

Sometimes when the snow was not so deep, Juergen would leap out ahead of me and make his own trail. Then, when the snow got deep again, Juergen slowed down and started following my footprints.



You can see the obvious spiritual lesson here! Jesus calls us to follow him. Sometimes we bounce out ahead of Jesus with bold confidence that we can handle whatever life has to throw at us. Then we encounter the inevitable deep snow with an icy crust. We fall in. We have to slow down. For a moment we keep trying to blaze our own trail. Finally, if we are humble enough to slow down, we can wait for the Master to pass. We can more efficiently continue our journey following in the big and confident footsteps of the Master, Jesus.

Jesus has gone before us to show us the way. Jesus said, "I am the Way." Thanks be to God that Jesus has the patience to wait upon us when we foolishly bolt out ahead and get hip deep in trouble.

That day my dog taught me a lot about my Lord's loving patience with me and the confident path of Jesus.

- **Motion** was made by Pastor Brenda to accept the Minutes from the December Council meeting and the Minutes from the short Council meeting held following the Annual Meeting on Feb 5 (*no meeting was held in January*). **Second:** Sue. **Carried.**

PASTOR'S REPORT

- Calendar items included a baptism and Faith Formation classes at SS; Confirmation classes have resumed; Ash Wednesday (2/22) worship times - brief worship at Geth at noon, full worship at SS at 6 pm led by the youth; weekly Lenten schedule will include Supper at 5:15, Service at 6:00 and Study at 6:30; next Joint Service 4/30.
- Ministry Moments included: Visits - Home: 3, Retirement Home: 1, and Office: 6 Roubal's worship possibly 2/26 and Menominee Health on 2/28; Two Synod Youth events were held - sledding 1/21 and a Lock-in at Zion on 2/10. It was noted that the Food Pantry is in dire need of funding! OLD/ONGOING BUSINESS

- a. Safe Church - Pastor finalizing documents. Council to review in 2023
- b. Disposal of overhead lights: 67 fluorescent bulbs were taken to Batteries Plus to be disposed of - total cost only \$15!

- c. HVAC Project: WELCA has committed \$500 as seed money to get the fund raising started; a letter has been written and will be mailed to all members outlining the needs and goals for raising \$'s to eventually replace our heating/cooling systems. A thermometer will be used to track our progress.
